From the port's three yards, 19 vessels were launched. Thirteen of them were of the usual fishing boat types, 53-73 feet in length, the others – two 36-foot long hospital launches, two yachts, one fishery research vessel and one steel trawler. In addition the last ship of the large Admiralty contract awarded to Buckie, a 156foot long coastal minesweeper and 104 foot steel trawler completed and handed over.

Sale after the fire - F. Ritchie, 72-74 East Church Street was advertising a Great Opening Sale, starting on January 10.

The T.V. and the Cinema - the question is being asked - Will the cinema eventually disappear? 350 cinemas closed in Britain during 1960 with those still open recording a great reduction in attendances.

Smiddy to close - The blacksmith's shop at Crofts of Dipple, where I used to watch the smith, John Cattanach, shoe horses back in 1937, when my Dad worked on the farm of Dipple and I was a pupil at Balnacoul School, closed on Mr Cattenach who is now 67 and who has been a blacksmith for 51 years raked out the embers of the fire, which has burned brightly for 85 years. He said that there was not one horse left in the locality where once they would shoe 250 a year. He added that big changes had taken place in his trade over the past twenty years.

He said that he would keep his hand in shoeing his pony Queenie that he uses to work his small piece of land.

It was noticed in July 2001 that the smiddy building is still standing though there had been plans to build a house on the site.

A launch at Buckie! - After the boom in shipbuilding that had been experienced through 1959 and 1960 a launch of a boat from a Buckie shipyard has become a rare occurrence.

The 'Coral Princess', an 88 foot long cargo/passenger vessel was launched from the shipyard of Herd and McKenzie on Thursday of last week.

There was no official naming ceremony but it is understood one will be held in Honiara the capital of the British Solomon Islands Protectorate when the vessel arrives there later in the year after completing her fitting out. She is of wooden construction with the underwater part of her hull sheathed in nylon. The Coral Princess is to be powered by two 152 hp Garner diesel engines and will be fitted with radar and w/t equipment.

The 136 ton vessel will operate a cargo and passenger –carrying service between the islands in the Solomon group.
