**Snowbound streets and pavements strongly criticised** - - The heavy snow of the past few weeks gave people across the Buckie area and wider afield little to cheer about. Although the Council made efforts to clear the main streets in the Buckie itself the minor streets and all the pavements received little or no attention. The small tractor sent round with a plough on the front and a gritter at the back was a waste of time. Not only was the snow cleared off the pavements but also they in turn became extremely dangerous when the snow at times turned to ice. The number of people who sustained broken limbs through falling was considerable.

One of those who vented his anger was Councillor Douglas Ross, Fochabers, who called for the way that resources were allocated to be reviewed and highlighted the dangers which often faced members of the public if snow and ice was allowed to build up on the pavements and pathways during an extended period of harsh weather such as has been experienced over the past few weeks. He said that he would have liked to see those on Community Service doing more to assist in the clearing up.

**'Taches grown and money gathered** - A local darts team have raised over £2000 for the charity Breast Cancer by ditching their razors for a month.

The lads from the Marine Hotel darts teams who play in the Buckie league, played their part in the recent November fundraiser which involved growing a moustache for the duration of November

On this trek we stayed with wonderful families, six day's walk from the nearest road, which struggled to have access to good water and sanitation.

He told the children of what a beautiful country Nepal was and tried to explain the differing needs people had living in the Himalayan foothills the plains of Terai and in cities such as Kathmandu.

Buckie Rotary Club has had a long tradition of international service with last year seeing work done with primary schools to raise awareness of the need for Shelterboxes in disaster areas.

Shelterboxes provide a range of essential basic tools, utensils, and other equipment for families who have been made homeless due to disasters.

Schools themselves raised funds to purchase boxes, which have been sent to disasters in places such as Haiti, Brazil and Pakistan

**Cullen Knitters Keep Craft Going.** A team of Cullen ladies have been using their knitting talents to offer comfort to others and they hope to encourage more people to get involved and keep the traditional craft alive.

The Knit 'n' Yarn group meets every Wednesday morning at 10.00am, in Cullen Community Centre and would welcome anyone who would be interested in joining the group.

Members produce some impressive individual pieces, including hats and blankets, which go a long way to offer cheer to those in need.

A number of the group are currently knitting squares, which will make blankets for the residents of Wakefield House Care Home in Cullen.

Hundreds of traditional hats have been made and sent to the Fishermen's Mission in Aberdeen to be used by foreign fishermen who fish off the shores of the northeast.

Over the years the group have supported a Christian project, which sends beanie hats to India, and some members have made quilts for seriously ill children through Project Linus.

One of the group Aril Bowie leads an after school knitting group for Cullen Primary School pupils with the help of some of the others who help out by teaching knitting to the pupils and supplying materials.

**Portknockie Air Raid to be Commemorated** - The 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of a World War II bombing raid on a local village is to be commemorated next month in a special service.

February 19<sup>th</sup> 1941 saw Portknockie attacked by a German Jug 88 bomber, which was to go on to drop two bombs, which killed three people and left a number of other injured before embarking on a strafing run. The raid and the

memory of those who were killed are to be marked on Saturday Feb 19, 2011 at a special service to be held in Portknockie Church of Christ, Seafield Street, at 10.00am.

One of the even organisers is Portknockie man CY Pirie, who is also a Committee member of the Cullen, Portknockie and Deskford Heritage Group. He has a personal link to the raid, as his aunt, Annabel Pirie, was the best friend of Margaret Mair, who died in the attack, aged only 16.

**Radio Equipment step forward for Radio BCK-** Radio BCK, Buckie's fledgling community radio station, took another step forward last week when broadcasting equipment was installed in the Town House.

A room off the upstairs hall, which is being rented by Buckie Area Forum, will be the nerve centre of the new station.

**Fishermen's Hall requires a face lift - Further** calls were made last week for the facilities at the Fishermen's Hall in Buckie to be upgraded. The poor state of many aspects of the hall, opened first in January 1<sup>st</sup> 1886, including the toilets, kitchen and Supper Room, were raised at last week's January meeting of Buckie Community Council. Community Councillor Allan Fraser told his colleagues that it was definitely time to "look at revamping the facilities", a point enthusiastically taken on board by Chairman Jim Smith. He said, "Now that the Fishermen's Hall has been saved from closure by the Council, for a year at least, it needs a lot of work to be done to it. The Supper Room is just a disgrace and badly needs to redecorate."

**Thistle Cup Dream Lives On** – "You could not have made this up" – that was the reaction of Jags President Mark Duncan to a week that saw the Scottish Cup visit Buckie a mere 24 hours before the Thistle were dramatically thrust back into the competition.

Dumped out of the tournament 1-0 on January 19 by East Stirlingshire, Buckie Thistle fans awaited anxiously to see if they were to be granted a reprieve after it emerged that their fourth round opponents had played an unregistered player in the shape of 21-year-old goalkeeper Michael Andrews, who is on loan from Falkirk. Following the meeting in Glasgow of the SFA committee the Shire were thrown out of the competition and the Jags cup dreams were reborn, meaning that they, instead of East Stirlingshire, were to meet Breeching City, in the next round, a mouth-watering home tie at the Victoria Park this Saturday.

**Community Kist Project** - A local community initiative is seeking the support of people in the Buckie area as they stand on the threshold of a bold new future.

'The Well', the base of the Milton Drive Community Project, is in the process of expanding to become the Buckie Community Kist (BCK), which will serve an area stretching from Portgordon to Cullen. They area also looking to take over and renovate the former NHS clinic building at Cathcart Grove, which has lain unused for many years.

The chairman of the group Peter Souter highlighted that by becoming part of the BCK project members would be giving themselves the chance to have a very real voice in how it develops.

"At the moment we are sitting at around 100 members, but our target is 800-900, or even more if we can," he said. "Obviously, we would like to reach this as quickly as possible, so I would urge people to come along and sign up."

**More Volunteers Wanted** - Buckie Credit Union have launched a drive to attract more volunteers, which could see them extend the range of services they offer.

Based at 'The Well' on Milton Drive, Buckie, and the B.C.U. Covers not just the town itself but the surrounding area and is part of the North East Scotland Credit Union.

However, a vital component of this service, which offers members the opportunity to access affordable loans, is the volunteers.

Gordon McPherson, from BCU, said, "The more volunteers we can get the better, not just to support our current services but to allow us to increase our opening hours."

At some point over the weekend of Feb 5-6 tree protectors and canes supporting the young trees were pulled out and the area left in a mess. It was reckoned that four or five trees had been lost, which were to be replaced with repairs undertaken at the site.

Feb 22 **"Black Day" Commemorated** – Victims of a terrifying bombing raid 70 years ago on Portknockie- described as one of the "blackest days" in its history- were commemorated at a special service in the village.

Villagers' young and old alike turned out in force to pay their respects at the Church of Christ in Seafield Street; with the service itself timed to coincide with the 10.00am cessation of the attack on a cold February morning in 1941.

Leading the service was Stewart Gray and the event featured a tribute by local man CY Pirie to those who were killed or wounded in the raid.

**Harbour Log** - Last week four fishing boats called into Buckie harbour to land their catches. The total catch was 542 bags of scallops.

Mar 1 **Babs Funding Axed** – Shock and outrage has greeted Moray Council's decision to axe funding to the Buckie-based BABS Dial –a Bus service

The elderly or disabled members of the organization, which has been running for the last 11 years, as well as their volunteers and nine members of staff, were left stunned when Moray Council's Public Transport Unit informed them by letter recently that their local authority funding contribution was to cease at the end of March as a result of the budget on February 10.

BABS Dial-a Bus service transports 500 elderly, disabled or disadvantaged Moray residents every month. These individuals live variously in Cullen, Portknockie, Buckie, Keith and Fochabers.

The people who use the service describe it as a lifeline for them, enabling them to do their shopping and get out of the house for doctor's visits and social outings.

As regards the withdrawal of funding from BABS Dial-a-Bus Council Deputy Convener Allan Wright confirmed that the funds would indeed be redirected to another service provider, which is to be Deveron Coaches. Two important questions have to be asked, why switch funding from an organization, which has proved its worth to another, which has still to earn its spurs. And most importantly will the all round service provided, i.e. suitable vehicles, and the necessary social help, carrying in messages for those unable to do so

Be on a par with that which people presently enjoy.

Mar 8 **a change of heart** – BABS Dial –a-bus staff and clients were celebrating last week as Moray Council dramatically cave in to mounting pressure and granted them a funding reprieve.

However, serious questions as to how this will be enacted and other ramifications of the Council climb down will see a number of councillors calling for a full investigation of the whole funding debacle at the appropriate committee.

**Tribute Dinner** - The Rotary Club of Buckie is to hold an Ian Middleton Tribute Dinner later this year. October 29 will see the event in honour of the late Mr Middleton of Arradoul (earlier of Whitefield Farm, Drybridge where his father Bob was tenant farmer) who was renowned for his Doric poetry and songs. This will be held in the Buckie branch of the Royal British Legion. He passed away in 1999.

Mar 15 **IT'S NAE a SCUNNER TAE be a HUNNER** - Sunday was a very special day for a grand old lady in Portknockie when she celebrated her 100<sup>th</sup> birthday. It was 100 not out for Helen Anderson of Pulteney Street as she marked the milestone birthday at a special party at the home of her niece, Helen Field, in the village's Admiralty Street. Friends and family gathered round to make the most of the occasion, with a warm and convivial party atmosphere the order of the day as people dropped in to convey their congratulations in person. John Fowlie, former Depute Lord Lieutenant of Banffshire, and Councillor Ron Shepherd, presented Mrs. Anderson with gifts on behalf of Clare Russell, Lord Lieutenant, and Moray Council respectively. Mrs Anderson lived for many years in Garmouth, remaining there after her husband died but moved to Portknockie five years ago into a smaller house and to be near Mrs Field and other family members.

**Big Day for the Baptist Congregation** – Saturday 12 March 2011 will go down as an historic day in the annals of Buckie Baptist Church, Cluny Place, when the building was officially reopened after an extensive revamp.

The church had reopened for Sunday services two weeks before.

Doing the honours at 2.00pm were Rebecca Munro and Janet Cowie, respectively the youngest and oldest members of the congregation. Around 200 people gathered to witness the event before enjoying the service, which followed. The day was rounded off with refreshments in the church hall.

While the building, which celebrated its centenary in 2010, by and large retains its traditional architecture on the outside, there are signs of the 21st century setting its own stamp. The roof now boasts solar panels, which will be used to provide constant ambient temperatures, which can be topped up when necessary from the gas-powered central heating.

An extension, featuring a new entrance, has been created at the Seaview Place side of the church, complete with a disabled access ramp.

The old windows have also been consigned to history with double-glazed replacements now in place to help keep the heat in and the draughts out. It is inside, however, that the greatest transformation has been wrought, quite literally from the floor upwards. Underfloor heating has now been installed throughout with new carpeting also having been laid. Gone are the old pews to be replaced with individual, comfortable seating the pulpit has been replaced and the church is now the proud possessor of a state of the art sound system.

The money to pay for the project, not a modest sum, was raised in a number of ways, including through offerings, concerts, a cook book, coffee mornings and a thrift shop.

The de facto project manager for the revamp was church member and experienced builder Duncan Urquhart, who was aided in accomplishing many of the labour-intensive tasks such as taking up the old floor by a legion of volunteers of which 'many of the best men were women' according to the church minister Rev. Vincent MacDougal.

Mar 22. **Buckie Student Probes Final Frontier Mysteries** - Twenty-two year old James Reid of Merson Street, Buckie a theoretical physicist, a graduate of Aberdeen University and who is presently studying at the Perimeter Institute of Theoretical Physics in Waterloo, Canada. Is about to submit his first results to the Institute of Physics Journal in the form of a paper entitled 'Conformal Structures, Associated Bundles and the Barbero-Immirzi Parameter' which will likely appear later this year?

Mr Reid told the 'Advertiser' that his field of research- Quantum Gravity- explores topics as diverse as the birth of the very universe itself, with current theories in physics pointing to the fabric of existence being far more complex than has ever before been imagined.

"Theoretical physics investigates how the universe works from the smallest atoms to the largest galaxies," he explained. "It is surprising, but many of the everyday things we take for granted, like TV's microwaves and more recently the Internet, all came from advances in theoretical physics." April 5 will see Seafield Medical Centre in Buckie and Cullen Medical Centre merge to become Seafield and Cullen Medical Group.

Heather Pirie, the Practice Manager for both centres was keen to highlight how this would benefit patients of both practices.

**Does Something Different Day** - For an entire village last Saturday marked a determination to do something different and boost the size and number of community groups.

A tow was established and the vessel towed to the mouth of the Lossiemouth harbour which she then entered under her own steam.

The 'William Blannin' was back at her mooring by 6.35pm after what was described as a 'routine' rescue.

April 19 **Boost for Heritage Centre** - There was good news last week for a local heritage group when Moray council agreed to waive hall hire fees for their forthcoming summer exhibition.

Cullen, Deskford and Portknockie Heritage Group were delighted when the local authority's Policy and Resources Committee gave the nod to allowing the group to use the Memorial Hall in Cullen Town Hall with no fee being charged to host their exhibition set to run over June, July and August. This will be the second year the exhibition has run, with last year's inaugural event being hailed as a huge success.

**Walking Group** – Walk Buckie is launching a new evening group. The weekly walks will take participants around the town on a 30-45 minute walk. The group is open to people of all ages and abilities.

The first walk will take place on Wednesday April 20, departing at 7.00pm from the swimming pool car park.

April 26 **New Facility opened at the High School** - Buckie Community High School proudly unveiled state-of-the-art performance facilities last week, bringing to an end years of planning and hard work.

The "1.8 million project, which gives the school some of the most modern performance facilities in the north east, was officially declared open last Wednesday morning by the Lord Lieutenant of Banffshire Clare Russell. She was helped to cut the ribbon to declare the new facility open by Head Boy Stuart Cowie and Head Girl Lauren Hay.

Opening the event was BCHS Rector David Barnett, with tributes paid to the new facility by Moray Council Convener Councillor George McIntyre and the chairman of the local authority's Children and Young People's Services Committee Councillor Jeff Hamilton. Two songs were performed by the school's Glee Club.

Drug search warrants were executed at four addresses in Buckie, Keith and Elgin. As a result, a 33 year old man and a 33 year old woman have been charged and two other men and women were also detained for questioning in relation to drugs offences. A quantity of drugs and money have also been recovered although the exact amounts involved have still to be established.

**Rotary Six-Harbour Walk** - Sunday saw around 400 people from near and far turn out to take part in the huge local fund-raiser that is the Buckie Rotary Club's Six Harbour Walk and cycle.

The good weather had its role to play in boosting the numbers of those registering at the last moment to raise cash not only for the primary Rotary-nominated charities but for the whole host of other good causes as well.

Although no funding targets were set for this year's walk the Walk convener Bill Greig said that he thought they would be happy if they made £15,000 or more. Over the years that the Walk has been running the sum of £120,000 for good causes, both local and national has been raised.

This year the primary focus of the Rotary's fund-raising efforts is Quarriers, CLAN, Shelterbox and local youth organizations and charities.

The 109-year-old flagship of the Scottish Fisheries Museum in Anstruther will be moored at the harbour over Wednesday and Thursday May 11-12 as part of a two-week tour of old herring ports in the Moray Firth. She will be open to the public from 10.00am - 5.00pm free of charge.

He was a great example of a life well spent and whether it was in his teaching career, war service amateur dramatics sporting interests or public service Mr Ettles gave his all to everything he did.

Bill who began his studies at the age of 16 graduated in 1939 and just after joined the Royal Navy where he served for six years in the meteorological department in Malta, Sicily, Italy and Egypt.

In 1969 he came from Keith Grammar when he was appointed Principal Teacher of English at Buckie High School where he remained until his retirement in 1983. He was highly thought of among both staff and pupils and many still have fond memories of him.

Former Deputy Headmaster Eddie Jagger said "Bill was a really nice guy and an excellent teacher."

**Scottish Parliament election** - The SNP gained a majority in the Scottish Parliament, the first party to do so in their own right. Due to boundary changes most of Buckie and the surrounding area fell into the brand new constituency of Banffshire and Buchan Coast with those living west of the Gollachy Burn remaining in the Moray constituency. Stewart Stevenson was elected MSP for the new constituency with a 67% share of the votes cast.

**Probus Club A.G.M.**- The Annual General Meeting of Buckie and District Probus Club was held in the Marine Hotel on Thursday April 28.

The Minute of the AGM of April 201 was duly read and approved before the Secretary Bob Jamieson gave his report on the past year, making mention of the various events that had taken place like the Christmas and Burns Anniversary Lunches and the bus outing to Cawdor Castle.

The club had been fortunate, he said, in being able to enlist four new members during the year but this was offset, sadly, by the loss of five through death while two others had moved away. The membership at present stood at 49.

Mr Jamieson also listed the various speakers who had spoken at the lunch meetings, their subjects being wide and varied and altogether most enjoyable.

Retiring President Eddie Gray in his valedictory address said he had to admit to having been quite apprehensive when he first put on the mantle of President but had gradually grown into the job and would always look on it to have been an honour to lead the club as President.

The flagship of the Scottish Fisheries Museum in Anstruther, Fife, and the vessel called into Buckie as part of an educational and promotional tour of the former herring ports on the Moray Firth. Schoolchildren and members of the public alike were welcomed aboard the 'Reaper' free of charge to see for themselves what life would have been like for the eight-man crew aboard the lovingly restored drifter, the class which was once the mainstay of the herring fleet on the east coast of Scotland.

The vessel is certainly no stranger to local waters, being a stalwart visitor to the Portsoy Boat Festival for many years now

Local primary schools were amongst the 34 invited to visit the 'Reaper' during her five harbour tour, within the region of 1300 pupils making their way round the historic vessel on a voyage of discovery of their own.

**Knockout success for Hospital Friends** - There was some knockout fundraising afoot at Linzee Gordon Park on Saturday when an 'It's a Knockout' contest got underway, attracting a total of eight teams.

Despite the rain the event was a great success and more than £8000 was raised, with sponsorship still being collected. Behind the afternoon of hilarity for all the family were the Friends of Seafield Hospital, whose fundraising over the years has seen a wide range of equipment purchased for the hospital and its patients and on an

occasion for those in the community also. It has to be said that the items bought by the Friends, paid for by money raised in various ways helped by donations, would not have been provided any other way.

**The ‘Lilywhites’ remain upstairs** - Buckie Rovers will once again be playing in Division! Next season after a nail biting wait to see if they would beat the drop. The weeks of uncertainty were ended when Bishopmill United, the team that had been in competition with the Rovers in the relegation battle, could only draw on last Tuesday evening away to Dufftown.

May 24 **Major award for the ‘Knockers’** Members of the Portknockie Community Association were celebrating this week when they learnt that their application for a substantial grant from Awards For All, The Big Lottery Fund, had been successful.

A grant of £10,000 has been awarded to the Association to fund a re-modelling scheme for Portknockie’s McBoyle Hall. The Portknockie Community Association has managed the hall since 2004.

The grant will pay for significant structural changes designed to enhance the environment the hall can offer community users.

The scheme will involve the lowering of the ceiling to provide a cavity for roof insulation, the fitting of new lights and re-decoration. The false ceiling will help to improve heating efficiency, will substantially reduce heating costs and will enrich the hall acoustics.

The changes are intended to alter the ambience of the McBoyle Hall, making it more flexible in use and better able to cater effectively for the community’s wishes to take part in a wider range of local social and recreational activities.

Chairman James Urquhart said: “We were thrilled when we found out that our application had been successful.”

**Death of former Councillor** - The well-known and much respected former Fochabers-Lhanbryde Councillor Tom Howe died last week.

Tom who lived at Nether Dallachy, died suddenly on Wednesday May 18 while on holiday in Germany with his wife Margo prior to embarking on a cruise.

He served the Fochabers-Lhanbryde areas for many years, serving on both Moray District Council and Moray Council. He was also an early SNP candidate for Westminster in the 1960’s. **(An obituary can be found on page 5 of this edition.)**

**Finechty fowk do a beach clean** - The community in Findochty came together recently for a beach clean event Organised by Findochty community council young and old alike turned out to clean all the beaches along the village’s coastline beginning with the harbour beach.

Council Chairman Andrew Slater said: “This is the first time we have done something like this and we have had a very enthusiastic response to the idea. There is a lot of community support for this, which we are very glad to see.

I do a lot of environmental work on the rig I am on so I thought it would be a good idea to do something like a beach cleans for the environment here in Findochty.”

**BCHS Head Pupils** - - Two deserving pupils at Buckie Community High School felt honoured to have been selected as the school’s new Head Boy and Head Girl, said both Kieran Murdoch and Josie Walls after being chosen for the prestigious titles.

All teachers and S5 pupils were invited to nominate any S5 pupil for the position and the top three faced a gruelling interview by Head Teacher David Barnett; Mrs Taylor, Depute Rector and Mrs Jagger, PT Guidance.

May 31 **Cullen School pupils are Quiz Winners** - Cullen Primary School were named as the champions in the Great Moray Inter-Schools Quiz 2011 after beating off competition in the had-fought final.

The Cullen team made up of Michael Reid, Caleb Mair, Cameron Paterson and Jennifer Walker, came out on top in the finals held in Elgin on Tuesday May 24.

A total of 44 teams from 28 primary schools across Moray entered the event. Competing were Applegrove, Bishopmill, Cullen, Knockando and St Geraldine’s Primary Schools.

The winning Cullen team received their shield from Alistair Farquhar, Moray council’s Head of Educational Resources. The Cullen team secured their place in the finals after coming out on top on the Buckie area contest. They were faced with questions on books, authors and general knowledge.

Elliot Office Equipment donated prizes to all the finalists. As well as the shield, the Cullen pupils each received book tokens and also scooped some books for their school, courtesy of Yeadon’s of Elgin and Banchory.

The MV Birch, registered in Antigua, also arrived empty and left for Waterford in Southern Ireland carrying 1801.000 tons of animal feeding pellets a by-product of the whisky industry.

**Spey Bay** - A successful businessman has rescued a struggling golf club in the area from administration and work is ongoing to transform it into a modern, bustling complex.

Colin Murray, who owns six businesses throughout the northeast and employs 90 people, bought Spey Bay Ltd., which runs the Spey Bay golf course and hotel complex in January and great improvements have already been made at the site.

Work already carried out at Spey Bay Golf Club has seen the old pavilion revamped and it now offers a bar and restaurant, which are open to the public.

Plans for the complex include introducing houses and a restaurant near the shoreline. The hotel is in a very bad state of repair and will prove to be a long-term project but Mr Murray hopes to revamp the building in some way and thought is currently being put to the project.

**100 Years Not Out** There were good wishes aplenty going the way of Linn Coort resident Andrew Horne when he celebrated his 100<sup>th</sup> birthday.

A native of New Pitsligo he served his time as a shoemakers but had a chequered work career, during WWII he worked as a welder in the Glasgow shipyards later working in the building trade as labourer and then as a mason. He moved from Aberdeen to Mosstodloch in 1991 when his wife died to be nearer his daughter. When he became less able he moved into sheltered housing first in Fochabers before moving to Buckie.

**Harbour Log** - Last week ten fishing boats called into Buckie harbour to land their catches, a big increase on recent weeks when two boats, sometimes only one was the norm. Despite the increased number 497 boxes of white fish, prawns and squid might be seen as not being a big all round catch. The boats were - Pegasus, Maggie J, Blue Sky, Scotia, Heather Sprig, Conquest, Carisma, Discovery, Shalimar and Just Reward.

Three cargo vessels paid a call all coming in on the same day There was only the one import, soya from Rotterdam with two exports – crushed aggregate destined for Glassom Dock and pulpwood logs for Moss in Norway.

June 14

**Double jobs blow for local area** - Buckie was dealt a bitter blow last week when it emerged that the local Haldane's supermarket is to close. The store, situated off East Cathcart Street, is due to close its doors for the last time at close of play today (Tuesday) as the independent retail group as a whole slid into administration last week. All but four of the group's 26 stores are set to shut

Twenty three people were employed by the local store, 21 store staff and two cleaners who will all be looking for jobs as with the Haldane's group going into administration there is no possibility of being redeployed to other stores

Haldane's opened in Buckie in February 2010 taking over the premises previously occupied by Somerfield's, another supermarket group.

Last weekend saw the local jobs gloom deepens when a major hotel ceased trading. The Seafield Arms Hotel in Cullen is believed to have shut its doors for good last Sunday evening after dinner service ended. Also shutting is the Kris Kros bar attached to the hotel.

Estimates have put the number of staff, including both part and full-time employees who have lost their jobs at between 20 and 30, placing it at least on a par with the redundancies announced at Haldane's in Buckie last week.

According to the Seafield Arms website the hotel offered 22 rooms as well as a restaurant, an extensive wine cellar and a choice of 122 whiskies.

The Seafield Arms Hotel, on Seafield Street, the main thoroughfare through the town, was built in 1822 by the Earl of Seafield and was greatly restored by the present Earl in 1972.

**Death of former Thistle player** - George 'Ruf' Stewart as he was known to many of a certain age, to distinguish him from another George Stewart who played around the same time for Buckie and who was known as 'Ru' died on June 4 at the age of 84. To others he was known as 'Seven Goal Stewart' because of his goal prowess, scoring this mammoth figures in one game on a number of occasions.

He made his debut for his home club on December 1945 when he scored two goals. His ability to score goals in a number of following games saw him quickly come to the notice of senior clubs and he was soon snapped up by Dundee where he played for four years. He was to play for a number of clubs thereafter on both sides of the border before returning to play out his career with the Thistle in season 1959-60 finally hanging up his boots in season

In leaving he paid tribute to all those who had backed him during his tenure. He is to be replaced by Alfie Morrison and Jackie Reid, both of whom have already had experience of being a manager of a junior side. Jackie Reid had a spell as joint manager of the Rovers some years ago while both of them have managed Deveronside. Although it had been loudly whispered for some time that the two were to take over it was only confirmed at the club's annual general meeting.

**Manager of the Year** - Gregg Carroll was voted Highland League Manager of the Year by his fellow managers fending off the spirited challenges of Scott Anderson of Deveronvale and Kris Hunter of Turriff United. Anderson was manager of league runners up while Hunter did remarkably well with Turriff United in their first season in the Highland League.

June 21 **Beechgrove Challenge** - Wind and rain did nothing to deter a band of volunteers last week in pledging their support for an ambitious TV garden project. The Whale and Dolphin Conservation Society wildlife Centre at Tugnet, Spey Bay is set to feature on BBC TV's 'The Beechgrove Garden's Community Garden project, which will see two gardens at the site, as well as other areas around the facility, transformed. Filming is planned to take place over a three day period encompassing August 31-September 2.

**Royal Honour for Music Stalwart** - A local musician who was the driving force behind the creation of Speyfest and the Fochabers Fiddlers is to receive a Royal honour. James Alexander, who lives at Auchenhalrig, is to receive an MBE for his services to Scottish traditional music in the Queen's Birthday Honours List.

June 28 **RNLI blow for Buckie** - Cost-cutting measures by the RNLI have seen the charity end its lucrative refit contract with Buckie Shipyard Ltd. Buckie Shipyard will join a number of yards up and down the country falling victim to changes in the RNLI's maintenance structure, with refit contracts being phased out over the course of the year. Only three yards- Alexander Noble and Sons in Girvan, Carroll's in Ireland and South Boats on the Isle of Wight - will retain refit contracts, although Buckie, along with other yards, will be eligible for repair and general maintenance work on RNLI vessels in the future as need arises.

**Big repair bill to be met for Fochabers Institute-** We will fight to save this hall - that was the message coming loud and clear from a public meeting last Thursday evening to discuss the future of the Fochabers Public Institute. Local community groups and residents banded together at the packed crises meeting, which was called by the Institute's Hall Committee, to reaffirm their support for the vital local facility. A report placed before Moray Council's Policy and Resources Committee on August 31 last year detailed a number of 'substantial defects' in the building and the meeting was to learn from Alex Burrell, from Moray Council's Estate's section, that essential repairs to the building to bring it up to an acceptable and safe standing would come in at an estimated £240,000

**Harbour log** - Last week seven fishing boats called into Cluny harbour, Buckie, to land their catches. In total this comprised 644 boxes of white fish, prawns and squid combined and 8 bags of scallops. The boats were - Carisma, Scotia, Discovery, Sunlight Ray, Sparkling Waters, Shalimar and Deeside. One cargo vessel paid a call. This was the British-registered MV Elektron II that came in light from Kristiansand, Norway on Wednesday and left again the following day bound for Newcastle carrying five steel reels with a total weight of 296.000 tonnes.

5 July **High School Departures** - Friday July 1 marked the last day in school for a number of members of staff at Buckie Community High School. Mr David Barnett, Rector, left to take up a new post as Head Teacher of Elgin Academy. Mrs. Joan Jagger, PT Guidance, retired after 34 years of service to the school

**Promotion** A change will also take place at Buckie Community High School when Mr David Strachan will be officiating as Acting Rector who was appointed following interviews that took place on June 30. Mr Strachan, a graduate in Geography has been an Assistant Recto at the school for the past 16 years.

**Harbour Log** – Last week twelve fishing boats called into Buckie harbour to land their catches. In total this comprised 420 boxes of white fish, prawns and squid together with 555 bags of scallops.

**RNLI Anniversary Boost** - Celebrations marking 150 years of the RNLI’S life-saving presence in Buckie have yielded a huge five-figure financial boost for the lifeboat charity.

June 12, 2010, saw a week of festivities get underway to commemorate the milestone anniversary. A whole host of events, including the return of a traditional Lifeboat Gala, ended up putting the 'fun' into fundraising and thanks to the generosity and combined efforts of all those involved a total of £11,042,25 has been raised. The cheque was handed over last Thursday to Buckie RNLI Branch Treasurer Ali Simpson at the Lifeboat Station. By Dr Alison Douglas Chairman of the 150 Steering Group.

A week that is unlikely to be forgotten in the annals of Buckie had its origins in a public meeting held in Buckie Community High School in April 2009 to ascertain public support for commemorative events to mark the 150th anniversary of the date when the first lifeboat came on the scene in Buckie.

Dr Douglas said that due to the need to ensure donations had all been accounted for and bills paid it had not been possible to hold the cheque handover at an earlier date.

With the cheque now presented to Buckie RNLI the work of the 150 Steering Group is now complete and they have now formally disbanded.

**Beat that** The beat of the drum produced an even bigger spring in the step for Buckie and District Pipe Band as they played in Portsoy last Sunday thanks to a huge Lottery boost.

There were celebrations for this group as they showed off brand new drums and associated equipment bought with a grant of £7759 from the Creative Scotland section of Awards for All, which is backed by the National Lottery.

Bought with money according to Pipe Major Robbie Innes of Fochabers were – six snare drums, one mini-snare drum, six tenor drums, one bass drum and other items required by drummers such as drumsticks and slings.

**A Mammoth Climb for Charity** - A Buckie woman has helped raise over £5000 to help support a new cancer hospice in Aberdeen.

Tracey Cormack, who works in HR for a drilling company in Aberdeen, recently undertook no less a challenge than scaling Mt Kilimanjaro in aid of CLAN'S (Cancer in Aberdeen and North) new facility under construction at Westburn Drive in the city. Thanks to her six-day efforts a total of £5530 was added to the total raised to date "I was part of a group of 11, some of whom were doing the ascent for charity, while others were doing it for the personal challenge," she told the 'Advertiser'. "It took us a total of four and a half days to get to the top and another one and a half days to get back down again. The most challenging part of the ascent for me was the summit night. Funding for the Lossie Seafoods purchase was sourced from Scottish Seafoods Investments, a joint venture recently established by The Scottish Salmon Co. and its major shareholder Northern Link to invest in companies engaged in value-added processing of salmon and other seafood.

Victor West, who himself hails from the fishing port of Fraserburgh, has been appointed as the new Managing Director of Lossie Seafoods, a role he will combine with heading up Moray Seafoods. From the previous posts he has held, Mr West has considerable knowledge and experience of the seafood industry.

Grant Eckersley son of the late Charles Eckersley, who first established Moray Seafoods is Commercial Director on Moray Seafoods, said how he could anticipate a bright future under Associated Seafoods ownership.

To add further interest to the occasion Buckie resident Wendy McLean and her husband Roy owned the Alpine sports car used by the two presenters to tour around their filming venues in Scotland for 30 years after being bought new in Elgin.

Aug 9 **Lennox Community Council** has secured a grant of almost £2000 from the Big Lottery Fund 2014 Communities Awards to allow a new football league for youngsters to get off the ground The scheme will follow the basic pattern of the successful Midnight League initiative with sessions being run later in the evening. Community chairman Colin Murray and secretary Arthur Fearnley were naturally delighted to be given the news.

However, the results of a scan revealed, on the day she was to die, alone and in pain on the floor of her room in Dr Gray's Hospital, Elgin, that there was a huge tumour present in her lung which was pressing on her arm and causing pain.

Sine her death Mrs. Cross's husband Colin, daughter Amanda Bush and son, also Colin, have fought a determined campaign to force NHS Grampian to admit to failures in her care and for a public apology to be made.

The full membership complement of Buckie Community Council is 12 and an election will take place in the event of they're being more candidates than seats.

On Tuesday, September 27, Mr Brown cut a ribbon and said a few words to mark the official opening of the stretch of road which bypasses Mosstodloch, linking the roundabouts to the west of the village and near Baxter's. Following the ribbon cutting ceremony the traffic blockades were removed at either end of the road and the first vehicles began to filter through, marking a moment of history in the making.

**Record Jags Signing** - Buckie Thistle last week welcomed top goal-scoring midfielder Mark Chisholm to Victoria Park when he signed a four –year deal with the club.

In a record signing for Buckie Thistle, with the transfer fee believed to be £16,000, Mark Chisholm signed on the dotted line on Thursday September 29. He comes to Buckie following a very successful 12-year career with Deveronvale.

**Car Show a Classic** – Gleaming ambassadors from a bygone age in motoring drew the crowds to Linzee Gordon Park on Sunday when the first Buckie Classic Car Show was held. (It later transpired that a Classic Car Show was held in the same park a number of years ago though the turn out was much smaller.) Four local vintage car enthusiasts, backed by Buckie Area Forum's Buckie Economic Regeneration Steering Group, came together to organise the free event, which ran from 11.00am-4.00pm.

Ian Ross, Brian Reid, Charlie McIntosh and John Ferguson not only brought along their own cherished classic motors but were also joined by over 100 other classic vehicles. Amongst the vehicles on show during the afternoon were a Rolls Royce and a Bugatti racing car.

The organisers were more than delighted with the success of the venture both in the number of vintage vehicle owners that chose to come to Buckie, also the size of the crowd of spectators. The lovely sunny day obviously played a part in this. The outcome was that already plans are being made for another show next year, hopefully bigger and better, with more stalls and entertainment.

**Harbour Log** – Six boats landed at Buckie last week, taking in 387 boxes of white fish, prawns and squid combined. The boats were transcend, Discovery, Transcend, Carona, Pegasus and Deeside.

One cargo vessel paid a call. This was the MV Sea Kestrel, registered in the Cayman Islands that arrived from Ipswich carrying 1855.260 tonnes of sugar beet. She sailed, light, for Invergordon two days later.

**Move up Speyside for Depute Rector** – The end of the school term saw pastures new beckon for Buckie community High School Depute Rector as he prepared to take over as Rector at Speyside High School.

Mr Engstrand is due to take over the reins at the Aberlour-based secondary after the October holidays. It brings to an end a six-year tenure at BCHS, where he arrived as Depute Rector after having previously served as PT English at Lochgelly High School in Fife.

**Ambitious hall plans launched** – The ambitious project to bring a brand new village hall to Portgordon took another significant step recently when plans were lodged with Moray Council.

Should the proposals get the nod from Councillors on the Planning and Regulatory Services committee, the stage will be set for a brand new community facility to be constructed near the green to the south of the harbour. This would replace the existing hall near Gordon Square, which would be sold, the process being ploughed back into the new build project.

Alan Scott, chairman of the Portgordon Village Hall Committee, explained some of the many benefits planned to accrue from the building. “One of the main things that came across from our public consultation on the new hall was the fact that it must be flexible in terms of use and it must be designed with this in mind,” he told the ‘Advertiser’. “The main hall will be able to be used either as one big hall or divided up into a bigger one and a smaller one, depending on what events are being held. Included in the building will be a designated area for the youth of Portgordon, kitchen and kitchen storage facilities, disabled toilets, perhaps a shower and an office-cum-meeting room.” **A full report on the proposed new hall is found on page one.**

**Heritage stalwart honoured- Tribute** was paid last weekend to a James Findlay honoured for his last 12 year's work as President of the Cullen, Deskford and Portknockie Heritage Group after passing on the baton to Cy Pirie, from Portknockie, at the group's recent AGM. He was presented with a bottle of 20 year-old malt whisky by long-standing Heritage Group member and friend Sandy Henderson as a token of respect for his time at the helm Mr Findlay was also handed a CD featuring images of his time with the group, of Cullen Auld Kirk and its minister, Rev. Guthrie. A bouquet of flowers was presented to his wife, Rita, by Brenda Wood, the ~Heritage Group's Vice Chairman.

**Rotary Club hand out cheques** - Over £15,000 was handed out to good causes last week following this year's Six Harbour Walk and Cycle. A total of eight organisations benefitted from their share of the £15,090 pot from the event, which is run by Buckie and District Rotary Club and was held on May 1.

Priority charity beneficiary for the 2011 even was CLAN (Cancer Link Aberdeen and North), who provide support for those with cancer living in the north and northeast, with their coffers receiving a boost to the tune of £10,000.

Social care charity Quarriers were handed a £2,000 fillip, with Shelter Box, a Rotary project which aims to provide basic equipment for people in disaster areas, being handed £590.

Also benefitting from the cash raised by the Six harbour Walk participants were local groups – the Quines' Club, 1<sup>st</sup> Cullen Guides, Spey Runners, Portessie Playgroup and 1<sup>st</sup> Buckie Company Boys' Brigade, all of which received cheques to the value of £500.

**Probus Club** - Greenland, the landscape and its people was the subject of the talk given by guest speaker Chris Sugden at the recent lunch meeting of Buckie and District Probus Club.

A country which few, if any, of present had ever visited was brought very much alive not only through dialogue but also by superb photography – shown by slides and film – made all the more pleasant to view by the soft background music played.

**Buckie Teen's Memory Honoured** - Play with courage and determination – that was the inspirational message for life as well as sport when the memory of a young and talented Buckie footballer was honoured last week.

Andrew and Christine Geddes – the parents of Zoe Geddes, who was only 13 when she lost her battle with leukaemia at Glasgow's Yorkhill Children's Hospital on May 25 this year – were presented with a framed strip by the Head of Buckie Thistle Youth Development Dave 'Parro' Findlay at Victoria Park last Friday afternoon as a mark of respect for her memory. Also present were her sisters Amy and Leah.

A keen footballer, Zoe was a promising and popular player BTYD'S Under 13 Girl's team and her loss was deeply felt by both her teammates and coaches.

The new strip incorporates Zoe's name in the fabric and at the family's behest, the badge is encircled with a motto that very much summed up Zoe's attitude to life itself: 'Play with courage and determination.' The move left Mr and Mrs Geddes deeply moved. **A fuller report together with a photograph is to be found on the front page of this edition.**

**Community Council Revived** - Sufficient nominations have been received to enable Buckie community Council to be re-established.

Eight people had put their names forward by the time nominations closed. They are Janet Cowie, William G. Cowie, John C. Cowie, Allan A. Fraser, Stephen Grant, Heather T. Innes, Ian D. MacPherson and James A.S. Smith.

The previous council was dissolved when membership fell below the required minimum number following three resignations at different times. A minimum of six nominations was required to re-establish the 123-seat Council.

The first meeting of the new Community Council is scheduled to take place on Tuesday November 1 in Room 1 of the Town House at 7.00pm.

**Hallowe'en Nicht** - A poem written in 1921 by 'Rob Roy' the nom-de plume of the late Alexander Robb and published in the 'Banffshire Advertiser' then received a second airing this week when it was handed in by Buckie man David Fowler who has a large collection of Mr Robb's work

**Buckie Classic Car Show** - Following the recent success of this event at Linzee Gordon Park a Buckie resident, Alistair Carter kindly handed into the offices of the 'Banffshire Advertiser' a number of photos he had taken the last time a vintage car show was held in the same venue, The date was 1962. Though the photographs clearly show a number of older cars lined up the numbers were not as large on the more recent occasion.

**Harbour Log** – Three fishing boats called into Cluny harbour last week to put ashore their catches. In total this comprised – 212 boxes of white fish, prawns and squid combined. The boats were Discovery, Carona and Transcend.

Two cargo boats paid as call. The MV Scot Ranger, registered in Britain, arrived light from Inverness. After taking on board 2203.000 tonnes of pulpwood logs destined for the paper industry she set sail again bound for Tofte in Norway.

The Norwegian registered MV Elektron II also came in light from Mandal in Norway. She left again for Newcastle carrying five large steel reels for the oil industry weighing in total 235.000 tonnes.

**Clochach School** (Formerly Enzie Public School for past pupils) the people of Clochach turned out in force last week to back ambitious plans to secure a bright future for their Community Hall. Clochach Community Hall Association's AGM last Wednesday evening, which saw a large turnout, was in stark contrast to last year's rather gloomy meeting with local residents brimming with confidence that the facility would enjoy a revitalised existence thanks to ambitious refurbishment plans.

The meeting was to heart from Paul Robinson, the Chairman of the special sub-committee created to drive forward development of the hall were progressing, and he began by outlining the stark contrast in circumstances between this year and last year. Last October, he said, the community were faced with the prospect, due, to 'structural issue' with the building, of Moray Council closing and selling the hall and at best offering the community part of the site to

build a new hall at their own expense. It was later discovered that root of this decision was a misunderstanding between a Council officer and the local authority's Policy and Resources Committee. Since then the Council have offered Community Hall Association a new 25 year lease on a full repairing basis and agreed to repair the kitchen gable wall, which will allow it to be used again. **A full report on the meeting may be read on page one and page 6 of this edition of the B.A.**

**Harbour Log** - Last week at Cluny harbour things were busier than they have been for some time with eleven fishing boats calling in to land their catches and no less than four cargo vessels paying a call. The total landing comprised 265 boxes of white fish, prawns and squid and also 210 bags of scallops. The boats were – Calisha, Reward, Blue Sky, Carona, Discovery, Provider II, Georgia Dawn, Jenna Maree, Heather Sprig, Carisma and Just Reward.

The MV Fingal, registered in the Dutch Antilles, arrived from Rotterdam carrying a cargo of soya weighing 1007.520 tonnes. She left empty bound for Perth. The British-registered MV Sea Mithril came in from Ipswich with 1891.680 tonnes of sugar beet on board. She left; empty, bound for the North Sea to await orders. The MV Noest (Dutch) imported 1632.360 tonnes of malt from Kings Lynn. She left again, empty, for Blyth. The last of the week the British-registered MV Falcon arrived from Mistley carrying 1650.000 tonnes of malt. In going to print it was not known when she would leave or whether she would have a cargo.

**Cullen Church Honours Elder** - Cullen and Deskford Church of Scotland honoured one of their number last week who has given nearly 50 years of service as an Elder.

At a special ceremony prior to the Kirk session meeting in the Hall Church last Thursday evening g Senior Elder Willie Taylor, 80, was presented with a beautiful wooden walking stick as a token of appreciation for his 48 years of service. His wife, Jean, was presented with a bouquet of flowers. Mr Taylor was ordained as an Elder in 1963 in Deskford Parish Church.

Taking over, as Senior Elder was James Findlay, who during the Kirk Session gave potted history of Mr Taylor's numerous contributions to the church over the years,

During his time as an Elder, Mr Taylor served under no fewer than six different permanent ministers, including the present incumbent, Rev. Douglas Stevenson.

**Tributes for local Doric legend** - The memory of widely respected local Doric poet and Scottish traditional music enthusiast Ian Middleton was honoured in style last Saturday when a special tribute dinner was held. Club and featured a whole host of special guests including Robbie Shepherd, Robert Lovie, Alex and Madeline Green, Pat Fraser and James Alexander and the Fochabers Fiddlers. In addition to some fine music, the evening also saw renditions of some of Mr Middleton's poems by Mr Lovie and Ms Fraser.

Ahead of the event an open Doric poetry competition was held, with the adult section being claimed by Edward Mitchell for his poem 'Buckie', reminiscence on what the town was like when he was a child. Mr Mitchell was presented with a specially commissioned trophy by Mr Shepherd and enjoyed hearing his poem recited.

Winning the children's section was Crossroads Primary School pupil Scott MacKinnon.

A special competition within Buckie-based Doric group the Buckie Blethers was also run, with the task set entrants being that of creating a grace. Taking the day was Buckie woman Caroline Fowler with 'Mince 'n' Tatties, which was felt to be most appropriate for the menu at the tribute dinner.

Behind the Ian Middleton Tribute Dinner was local man Charles McKay, a member of the Rotary Club and himself no stranger to the north Scottish traditional music scene as a singer.

**Buckie Community Council Revived** - Buckie Community Council were reconstituted last week at a special meeting in the Town House.

The 12-seat group was dissolved earlier in the year after resignations pushed them below the minimum level of members required.

Taking the role of Chairman again is James Smith, with a new face Ian MacPherson, being elected as Vice Chairman. Gordon Cowie remains as secretary with Heather Innes – another new member – agreeing to take on the

task of Minute Secretary. Completing the complement of office bearers was John Cowie, who is now BCC Treasurer.

Joining them on the community council are Stephen Grant and Allan Fraser, who both served on the previous group and new member Janet Cowie. Allan Fraser first joined Buckie Community Council in 1984.

International honour for St Peter's School - St Peter's Primary School in Buckie has been honoured with a prestigious international award for their outstanding work in bringing the world into the classroom. Last week saw the announcement that the whole school from Nursery right through to Primary 7, have scooped the British Council's coveted International School Award for a project that has seen them forge close links with schools in six different nations over the last two years or so.

Ongoing work on opening up the world to pupils at the school, including highlighting Fairtrade and international education, saw the school apply for the British Council project, which was to prove successful and came along with funding to allow a number of visits between the schools involved. **War Fallen Honoured - Remembrance** Sunday saw the nation bow its head in honour of the war fallen as services took place locally and up and down the land. Communities came together to commemorate those who had made the ultimate sacrifice in conflicts both past and present, with church services and war memorials providing focal points for the day

Traditionally associated with the two World Wars, Remembrance Sunday also provides an opportunity to honour those who have fallen in the myriad conflicts involving British Armed Forces right up to the present ongoing situation in Afghanistan and the battle against the Taliban. At the time of writing, the conflict had already claimed the lives of 383 British service personnel since troops were first deployed in 2001. Countless more have been wounded, many severely and to their permanent disablement.

Pictures throughout this copy of the B.A. Show the scenes at the various war memorials as well as at Buckie the march of ever decreasing number of ex servicemen.

**For sale** – Two businesses are presently for sale on West Church Street. The property at number 31 opened as a restaurant over three years called 'Food for Thought'. A good deal of money was spent on a complete refurbishment of the building and the installation of the best of fittings. There was a throw back to the whisky industry, with which the past owner had connection, with the seats formed from barrels, with tartan also prominent

The other property to bear the for sale signs is number 56, which for a number of years has been a 'cash and carry' Chinese 'Take Away' ran by Hang Hing, who has been in business in Buckie for a long time opening first on St Paul's Street. Both men had to retire on account of ill health. The property at 31 is relatively new dating from around mid 1960's but has seen a variety of enterprises occupying the property since that time. Number 56 on the other hand dates from around the beginning of the twenty-century and up until Mr Hing opened his 'Take Away' had always been a garage beginning with Miller, other firms some may remember are Webster, Simpson and Robertson, while Nellie Miller also came back to Buckie to run it for a while with her son Raymond Scorgie.

**Buckie War Memorial** - As Buckie and the local area, along with communities up and down the land honoured the war fallen on Remembrance Sunday, a poem appears in this week's edition of the B.A. Harks back to a time when the memorials taken for granted today were something relatively new. The poem that first received its first airing in 1921 and written by Alexander Robb, who used the nom de plume of Rob Roy and entitled 'Buckie War Memorial calls on the then Town Council to stir itself to erect a memorial, to those who marched away to the Great War never to return. He also lambasts them for being the last in the area to construct a memorial, adding that if they felt not equal to the task that they should step aside. (The Buckie War Memorial was not unveiled until 1925 as the Town Council were of a mind to purchase the Cluny Hotel as a memorial to the fallen with rooms inside, such as a snooker hall, being set aside for those servicemen who returned. They eventually had to drop the idea when public opinion, at the time, was all for erecting memorials such as that which was eventually built.)

**National award for top notch Louise** - Excellence brought its own reward for a former Buckie Community High? School student when she was honoured for scoring the top mark in a national exam.

Louise Mair, from Portknockie, who only turned 18 at the weekend, left S6 at BCHS in the summer, but not before she had scored 75 marks out of a possible 80 in her Advanced Higher Graphic Communication, and took full marks

in two folio presentations, a feat which saw her invited to attend the Technical Teacher's Association conference in Edinburgh to receive a special certificate and cheque to honour her achievement

If that were not enough Ms Mair, who is currently working with Forsyth's in Buckie as an Engineering Assistant, was also one of only three students across Scotland to score 100% in her Higher Photography- one of her photos, that of the Bow Fiddle rock at Portknockie taken at dawn, was later presented to Prince Andrew during his recent visit to the school as a memento of the day -and gaining A grades in her Advanced Higher Maths and Physics.

**Clochach Hall Secures Lottery Grant** - Generous funding has been awarded by the National Lottery's Awards for All grants scheme to help fund ambitious refurbishment plans at Clochan Community Hall.

A grant of £10,000 was welcomed by the Clochan Community Hall Association who plans to put the money towards the cost of renewing the flat roof over the entrance to the hall.

Following a complete survey of the hall, it is estimated full repairs will reach around £60,000 over the next four years. The works have been divided into three sections- urgent, essential and desirable. The committee intend to try and access funding from other sources.

**Buckie Blethers to launch DVD** - The local group whose speciality is verse, songs and sketches are to launch their DVD entitled 'Nithin Like a Blether' when they host an evening of entertainment in the Royal British Legion Hall on November 25.

**Christmas 'Kracker' Goes with a Bang** - It was a weekend to remember for the area when the Buckie Christmas Kracker exploded on to the scene. Last Saturday saw the first major Christmas event in the tradition of the former festive carnivals to hit the town in many a year, and there was something special for everyone.

Cluny Square was the focus of the entire Yuletide goings on under the banner of Buckie Christmas Kracker. With the sun shining brightly people, old and young flooded into the streets, which had been closed to traffic for the occasion to make the most of the extravaganza.

The festival is the first of what the organisers, Buckie Business and Retail Association hope will be an annual event to make the town's Christmas lights switch on a major part of the town's festive calendar. Funding for the event has been provided through a mixture of planning gain money from Tesco designed to boost the town centre, sponsorship and cash generated during the course of the Kracker. The day ended with a bang, the switching on of the lights and a fireworks display **A full report of the event can be read on pages 18 and 19 of the B.A. of this date.**

**New Fochabers Group** – Fochabers businesses and community groups have come together with the aim of creating a positive and coherent vision for the future of the village as the bypass nears completion. 'Just Art' on the village's High Street provide the venue for the launch of the Fochabers Future Group, which brings together representatives from the Fochabers Business Folk organisation and those from other groups and associations.

The fledging organisation will seek to co-ordinate changes in the village which will come about as a result of the bypass, which is due to fully open in February 2012. It is hoped that there will be a significant boost to visitor numbers with people attracted by the eased parking situation and wide range of shops and other businesses.

**End of an era as Portgordon Methodist Church closes** - Nearly 140 years of history drew to a close last Saturday when Portgordon Methodist Church held its last service. The reasons for its closure basically because of finances and the fact that the congregation is decreasing.

Minister Re. Martin Kennan led a final service at 2.00pm last Saturday after noon which focussed on all the happy occasions at the church rather than any sadness at its closing. A minister was first called to Portgordon in 1872 and the church was opened in 1874. Prior to this, and in common with many Methodist congregations up and down the land, services were held in a house until a church could be built. Since about 1920 Portgordon did not have a resident minister and was linked pastorally with Buckie.

Portgordon was one of six Methodist societies on this part of the coast – the others being at Buckie, Portessie, Findochty, Cullen and Banff – and stemmed from a revival of the 1850's led by James Turner a Peterhead cooper.

Turner's ministry is little known outside northeast Scotland and was quite brief, but its consequences have been powerful and long lasting. Following his conversion he preached in many towns and villages along the Moray Firth coast. Vigorous societies sprang up among these fishing communities. In due course Ministers were called and churches were built and in some cases rebuilt to meet demand.

**Strike protest sends pension warning** - Local public sector workers joined around two million of their colleagues across the UK last Wednesday in strike protests over new pension proposals, It is being cited as the biggest walkout since the General Strike of 1926 and on a par with the Winter of Discontent in 1979. The most visible effect of the industrial action in the Buckie areas was the closure of Buckie Community High School and its eight feeder primary schools from Portgordon through to Cullen. Across Moray only five schools remained open, all in rural areas.

**Golden anniversary for Theatre Group** - For the dedicated team of volunteers known as Buckie Lyric Theatre Group last week's Panto production of 'Cinderella' was an extra special occasion as they celebrated their 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary. It was an extra special occasion for the two longest serving members producers Keith Mackay and Liz Imlach. Keith joined the group in 1975 with Liz joining him four years later.

Laying the foundations five decades ago for what has become a stalwart of the area that attracts people in from miles around were the four founder members – Ruby Hughson, Bessie Robertson, Nancy McGregor and Sinclair Cowie. Their version of 'Cinderella' was produced by Nancy. It was to star Ruby in the title role, Bessie as Prince Charming and Sinclair as one of the Ugly Sisters. Some of the others playing lead roles were William Cowie (the Baron), Margaret Dallow, nee Holmes, (Dandini), Jack and Sinclair Longmore (the Broker's men) and the donkey), Karl McQueen (Buttons) and Bill Murray (Ugly Sister).

**Special day for Steve** – Last Sunday was a special day for the members of Buckie Baptist Church as they witnessed one of their numbers ordained into the Ministry.

Stephen Oyarzabal, 48, who had served the church for five years as a community worker, put the word 'Reverend' before his name after the ceremony. He had already successfully completed his studies with the Baptist Union of Scotland.

Rev Oyarzabal, his wife Julie and sons Matthew and Nathan, will be off to pastures new by the end of the year to work on starting a new community church in Forfar, which comes under the banner of the Baptist Union of Scotland.
